What is **Dispute Board**

- Dispute Board (DB) is a type of contractual ADR method
- DB main objective is to allow the contract to be completed, as soon as possible without interruptions
- The Dispute Resolution Board Foundation (DRBF) considers that the purpose of a DB is:

"to encourage dispute avoidance and to assist in timely and cost-effective resolution of disputes for the duration of a project"^[1]

- DB is parties own choices or by impositions of financing agencies, like World Bank and other developing banks



What is **Dispute Board**

- DBs are a consequence of contractual provisions
- DBs answer to a dispute may be considered :

recommendation, as usual in North America, and it is up to the parties to accept them or not (DRB)
decision or adjudication, which must be followed immediately as in other continents (DAB or DAAB)

- Standardized models of contracts provide the use of DBs since 1999, published by ICC, FIDIC and NEC
- FIDIC include dispute adjudication boards (DABs) and since 2017 dispute avoidance and adjudication boards (DAABs), with biding decisions



Dispute Board in brief

- DB is a panel of <u>3 experts</u>, experienced, impartial and trusted professionals, frequently 2 engineers and 1 lawyer
- Selection of DB members made by parties or nominating body
- DB main activities :
 - periodic meetings
 - site visits
 - special hearings
 - informal assistance
 - studies of issues and divergences
 - answers to disputes (decision or recommendation)

- DB answer can be challenged later in any situation, either in litigation or in arbitration




Brazil Legal framework

- Civil law tradition, with some influence of common law institutions
- Judicial system divided in Federal and 27 State Courts
- Judicial proceedings of civil nature are governed by Code of Civil Procedure CPC
- Right to appeal to the second instance (Federal or State Court)
- Appeals to higher courts Superior Court of Justice STJ or Federal Supreme Court STF (constitutional issues)
- Main stages: filing, answer, production of evidence, jugdement

Inaugurated in September 1974 More than 5 million passengers per day (2024) Extension 104 km 6 Lines and 91 stations

Extension 12,8km and 11 stations

~700 thousand pas/ day (December 2024)

Phase 1 > tunnels, yards and 6 stations

- EPC contracts signed October 2003 (World Bank model) Start operation April 2010, completed September 2011

Phase 2 > 5 stations

- Contract terminated > 1 station 2014 (2012~2015)
- Remaining 4 stations
 FIDIC MDB 2010 construction contract (DBB) signed July 2016
 First station January 2018, completed December 2021



Metro São Paulo Yellow line DB

Phase 1
 Contracts October 2003 ~September 2011
 DRB 3 engineers July 2004 ~ June 2015 ^[2]
 11 recommendations (1arbitration)

Phase 2
 Contract July 2016 ~December 2021
 DAB 2 engineers and 1 lawyer July 2017 ~ 2023 ^[3]
 18 decisions = 11+7 decisions (1 litigation, local consortium)
 Decision N°1 on litigation



Phase 2 DAB decision Nº1

<u>Submission</u> Disposal of waste soil contaminated from the excavation of a section of 270m (VCA Vila Sonia)

<u>Issue 1</u> Process of disposal with 2 possibilities with different contractual prices (co-processing or thermal desorption) <u>Issue 2</u> Quantity of waste soil disposed and contaminated

DAB Procedure 2 meetings 3 documents submissions

<u>DAB decision > settlement decision > contract amendment</u>



Phase 2 DAB decision Nº1 challenge


<u>Injunction</u> Submission of injunction Preliminary injunction granted (1st instance) Injunction revoked (2nd instance)

Evidence Start of engineering and accounting evidence Experts reports Parties comments of experts reports Experts clarifications Parties comments of experts clarifications

Judgement?




Timeline DAB decision Nº1





Timeline contract with litigation





Conclusion

<u>Contract</u> 6 years duration Completion 3 years after decision's contract amendment

<u>DAB decision</u>4 months to a decision (adjudication)7 months from decision until contract amendment (excluding injunction)

<u>Litigation</u> 7 years and it's not over yet Lasting more than 3 years after works completion

A DAB decision makes the contract continue until completion
